Attendees heard from speakers that covered topics on how to run live production operations efficiently, how to relate to co-workers in different generations, litter management, water quality, sanitation, incubation differences, antibiotic free production and breeder farm depopulation.



## The Center for Food Animal Wellbeing held 7th Annual Symposium

Considerations and innovations in transporting poultry and hogs and the challenges and opportunities in managing beef cattle health and wellbeing were among the topics covered Aug. 3 during the Center for Food Animal Wellbeing's seventh annual symposium on current issues and advances in food animal wellbeing.

"This year we had something special for everyone beginning with the issues around food animal transportation, how technology will improve animal welfare, behavior of beef cattle, and the impact of new regulations on everyone in animal agriculture and beyond," said Karen Christensen, Extension Poultry Specialist and Associate Professor in Poultry Science. Since the retirement of Dr. Yvonne Thaxton, pictured above, as Center Director, Christensen hosted the symposium this year for the Center for Food Animal Wellbeing.

Speakers included Kate Barger, director of world animal welfare, Cobb-Vantress; Yi Liang, associate professor, extension, agriculture and biological engineering, University of Arkansas; Jason McAllister, director of animal welfare, Triumph Foods; Jeff Carroll, research leader, USDA-Agricultural Research Service Livestock Issues Research Unit; Hongwei Xin, director of egg industry center, Iowa State University; Yvonne Thaxton, emeritus director Center of Food Animal Wellbeing, University of Arkansas; Emily McCormack, animal curator and internship director, Turpentine Creek Wildlife Refuge; Stacy Mason, senior breeder field representative, American Kennel Club; Kimberly J. Murphy, IACUC research compliance analyst, University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences; and Elizabeth Rumley, senior staff attorney, National Agricultural Law Center, University of Arkansas.

The goal for the Center for Food Animal Wellbeing is to improve animal health, animal handling, food safety and productivity by developing and defining objective measurements of wellbeing including measures of behavior, stress physiology, neurophysiology, immunology, microbiology and production efficiency.





Forty-eight participants attended the half-day Broiler Carcass Gross Pathology and Disposition meeting on Aug. 8 at the Pauline Whitaker Animal Science Center at the University of Arkansas. Organized by Dr. John Marcy, Extension Food Scientist, the meeting brought together industry personnel from Arkansas and Missouri for both lectures and disposition discussions.

"The broiler, turkey, woody breast pathology and disposition meeting was a productive 1/2 day because of participation from Springdale District Supervisory Public Health Veterinarians, Front Line Supervisors & District Office personnel along with industry personnel and product samples from many of the Arkansas / Missouri facilities," said Dr. Marcy. "Dr. Douglas Fulnechek from Zoetis, Dr. Jeffrey Samples and Dr. Stanley Baker from FSIS led the disposition discussion at different tables."
